According to The Times of India (May 2024), the allegations of the NEET-UG 2024 paper leak triggered nationwide concern among students and parents, raising serious questions about the credibility of India's public examination system. Initially, the National Testing Agency (NTA) denied the allegations; however, subsequent investigations by the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) confirmed that the question paper had been illegally accessed before the examination at selected centres.
2. The Hindu reported that the controversy was no longer viewed merely as an incident of examination malpractice but as a challenge to the integrity and transparency of public examinations. The newspaper highlighted students' protests, legal proceedings, and demands for greater accountability in examination governance.
3. As reported by The Indian Express, the controversy generated widespread public debate regarding examination security, fairness, and equal opportunity. The report emphasized that millions of students who had prepared honestly felt psychologically affected by the allegations, irrespective of whether they were directly connected to the leak.
4. According to Reuters, the NEET controversy significantly affected students' trust in the public examination system. The report noted that repeated examination irregularities have generated frustration among aspirants, who increasingly perceive merit-based selection to be vulnerable to organised malpractice, thereby weakening confidence in public institutions.

Based on the available literature, government records, and reports published in newspapers such as The Times of India, The Hindu, The Indian Express, The Economic Times, and Reuters, it can be inferred that repeated allegations and incidents of NEET paper leaks have significantly undermined students' trust in India's public examination system. The controversies surrounding both the 2024 and 2026 NEET examinations demonstrate that examination malpractice is not merely a legal or administrative issue but also an educational challenge affecting students' psychological well-being, perceptions of fairness, and confidence in merit-based selection. The literature consistently suggests that restoring students' trust requires transparent governance, robust technological safeguards, institutional accountability, and continuous reforms to ensure the integrity and credibility of public examinations.
